

INTRODUCTION

Dear members of the Teams

In the plan that the Leading Team set out at the International Gathering at Fatima in 2018, we set the general theme "Do not be afraid, let us go out".

Within this, we gave different annual themes. So far, the stages of our journey are:

- 2018-2019 "Let us go out to serve, assuming our weaknesses"
- 2019-2020 "Called to be holy"
- 2020-2021 "Marriage, sacrament of mission"
- 2021-2022 "The Christian couple, leaven of renewal for the family and society"

To encourage reflection on being agents of renewal, we think that we could not have a better background than the Encyclical "Laudato Si¹". In it, Pope Francis states: "Many things have to change course, but it is we human beings above all who need to change. We lack an awareness of our common origin, of our mutual belonging, and of a future to be shared with everyone. This basic awareness would enable the development of new convictions, attitudes and forms of life. A great cultural, spiritual and educational challenge stands before us, and it will demand that we set out on the long path of renewal." (LS 202).

The Teams Movement, on its journey with the Church, of which we are a part, has always listened attentively to the voice and guidance of our Popes, and this is why in the ERI we believe that we cannot allow the Encyclical "Laudato Si" to remain outside our formation journey. Importantly, "Laudato Si" develops the concept of integral ecology, as a model for expressing the fundamental relationships of the person: with God, with himself, with other human beings and with creation. Team members, like all humanity, must be careful not to fall into the danger of "anthropocentrism", making a dichotomy between our human and spiritual growth, and the natural and non-human world. "Nothing of this world is indifferent to us" (LS) because everything is part of the Gospel of creation.

With this framework in mind, in January 2020, we invited SR Portugal to write the study topic. Our proposal was received with great enthusiasm and generosity by its Responsible Couple, Margarida and José Machado da Silva. They formed a working group and immediately began writing this study topic. We send our thanks and appreciation to all of them for the conscientious and enriching work carried out. This study topic will undoubtedly make a great contribution to our formation journey.

When we in the ERI agreed on the direction for this year and the writing of this study topic, we could not have guessed the impact that the SARS-CoV-2 virus, the cause of the disease known as COVID-19, would have on the lives of all the inhabitants of our "common home". Words like pandemic, epidemic, quarantine, lockdown, second wave, asymptomatic or coronavirus, rarely used before, have become the words most commonly used across the world and in all daily searches on the internet.

In his encyclical "Laudato Si", published in June 2015, Pope Francis could not have anticipated what we would experience five years later. However, with deep insight, Pope Francis outlined the need for the protection of nature, for the care of our common home, for an awareness of a common origin, of a mutual belonging and of a future shared by all. Only this sense of responsibility, shared by all, can lead us to build a sustainable future for the next generations.

During the writing of this study topic everything changed. The world was subjected to the destructive advances of a previously unknown virus, which in a few weeks changed our lives, our plans, the orientation plans of our beloved movement, and the agendas of our meetings. The World Meeting of Families, which was to be a preamble to the regional meeting in Rome where we would hand over this

study topic, was cancelled by the Vatican, as was the international meeting of Regional Couples itself, which was cancelled after discernment and decision by the ERI.

Despite all this, the relevance of this study topic has not changed at all, but in our present circumstances has become even more relevant! At the beginning of last year, before the spread of COVID 19, Pope Francis invited all Catholics and all well-intentioned people, to celebrate the fifth anniversary of this important encyclical and take steps to better care for our common home. This was another particularly good reason for having this encyclical as a reference for our annual study topic. In 2020, Pope Francis also issued the Apostolic Exhortation "Querida Amazonia" (Beloved Amazon), which was largely based on his encyclical "Laudato Si" and on the reflections of the participants in the Special Synod of Bishops for the Pan-Amazonian Region held in October 2019. This exhortation is not only local in character, but is wider reaching, enriching our thoughts on the preservation of the environment and our joint responsibility to help each other globally.

Dear family of the Teams of Our Lady, it is with great joy, in these difficult times in which we are living, that we invite you to immerse yourself in personal and couple reading, to exchange thoughts and ideas as a team, and to put into practice the actions that this wonderful topic will awaken in you. Enjoy studying the nine chapters that make it up, keep referring to the encyclical "Laudato Si" and the exhortation "Querida Amazonia", with the reassurance that this will be a precious way of helping us to be Christian couples, the leaven that renews the family and society.

Under the protection of Our Mother Mary and enlightened by the Spirit, we ask that this be so.

The Christian couple, the leaven of renewal for the family and society.

In the study topic for the year 2021-22, "The Christian couple, leaven of renewal for the family and society," we are invited to reflect on the importance of God in our families. We must do this not merely by strictly observing God's law, but by recognising ourselves first and foremost as children and seekers of God. Recognising ourselves in this way transforms mankind's relationship with the world. We become people immersed in the wonder of divine creation and see everything differently: nature, spouse, family, the society in which we live.

At this time in human history, in order to safeguard our "common home", both spiritually and physically, Christians must be steadfast in their contemplation of and commitment to the Word of God. We are all called to carry out God's will for each one of us and for our families."... the Lord speaks and summons the earth ... from the rising of the sun to its setting. ... Our God comes and does not keep silence! " (Ps 50:1-3) The family, in God's plan, is co-creator of the renewal of this common home.

For us, couples, widows, widowers and team spiritual counsellors, there is only one way, to grow together towards holiness, because the Lord has explicitly asked it, "that they may be one as we are ONE: " ... I in them, and You in me, that they may become completely one, so that the world may know that You have sent me, and that You have loved them as You have loved me. "(In 17:22-23).

General structure

The plan which we propose for the study of "The Christian couple, leaven of renewal for the family and society" is based, fundamentally, on the Encyclical Letter *Laudato Si*, on the words of Father Henri Caffarel and on other documents of the Catholic Church. The course of study will take a comprehensive approach to the Teams couple's view of their relationship with God, with the world, and how they can renew and change their world.

In the first and second meetings we reflect on God's view of mankind; in the third, fourth, and fifth meetings we evaluate the family's relationship with the world; in the sixth, seventh, and eighth meetings we consider the effect of the Christian family as an agent of change in this world; and in the ninth meeting we reflect on the end of family life, God. In the tenth meeting, by way of conclusion, the previous nine meetings are reviewed, and each couple and Team is invited to identify new attitudes and/or forms of action.

Themes for each Monthly Meeting

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For the preparation of the first meeting

- Read the prologue to the Encyclical Letter Laudato Si [LS, 1-16].
- Contemplate as a couple the path you have already lived together and, in personal prayer, give thanks and praise to the Lord
- Prayerfully read (Lectio Divina) the biblical text for the next meeting (Acts 17, 24-28)

Meeting 1 - The Beauty of Creation

Introduction

"In the Judaeo-Christian tradition, the word "creation" has a broader meaning than "nature", for it has to do with God's loving plan in which every creature has its own value and significance. Nature is usually seen as a system which can be studied, understood and controlled, whereas creation can only be understood as a gift from the outstretched hand of the Father of all, and as a reality illuminated by the love which calls us together into universal communion."(LS, 76) In other words, we and all the beings of the universe are created by the same Father, we are united, and we form a kind of universal family, which impels us to a sacred, loving and humble respect." (LS, 77)

We are asked to contemplate creation, to let ourselves be enveloped by its beauty and to give way in wonder, seeing in it the very presence of God. "When we can see God reflected in all that exists, our hearts are moved to praise the Lord for all his creatures and to worship him in union with them." (LS, 87)

Reading of the Word of God and Meditation [Acts 17:24-28].

Liturgical Prayer - [PS 8, 4-10]

O LORD, our Sovereign, how majestic is your name in all the earth!

When I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars that you have established; what are human beings that you are mindful of them, mortals that you care for them?

Yet you have made them a little lower than God, and crowned them with glory and honour. You have given them dominion over the works of your hands; you have put all things under their feet, all sheep and oxen, and also the beasts of the field, the birds of the air, and the fish of the sea, whatever passes along the paths of the seas.

O LORD, our Sovereign, how majestic is your name in all the earth!

Sharing on Endeavours

this meeting we give priority to **Personal Prayer**, which leads us to intimacy with the Creator and with Creation, the work of His hands.

Sharing Reflections on the Study Topic

Based on the challenges and attitudes proposed at the beginning of this meeting, it is suggested that the couple prepare the study topic based on these questions. The important thing is to focus on the reality and not the theory.

- 1. How do we look at Creation? Do we welcome it as a reflection and gift from God or do we use it only as a benefit that we have at our disposal? Reflect on our daily attitudes.
- 2. Has the enforced standstill that humanity has experienced during the coronavirus pandemic changed my/our relationship with the creation that God has prepared for me/us?
- 3. In these times when the place and dignity of the human being in creation seems to have been weakened, how do I proclaim daily the values of the Gospel in relation to ecology?

Final Prayer

This is the time when the team members pray for their intentions and for everything that has come into their hearts during the meeting. To begin the final prayer of this meeting we call upon a deeply Catholic Portuguese writer, **Sophia de Mello Breyner Andresen.**

"I call You because everything is still in the beginning.
And to endure is the longest of times
I beg You to come and give me freedom,
May one of Your glances purify me and finish me.
There are a lot of things I do not want to see.
I ask You to be the present.
I ask You to flood everything.
And may Thy kingdom before time come
And be spread over the Earth
Like a ferocious Spring in a hurry."

Suggestions for the month

Yet we are called to be instruments of God our Father, so that our planet might be what he desired when he created it and correspond with his plan for peace, beauty and fullness. [LS, 53]

- Read the first chapter of the Encyclical Letter Laudato Si [LS, 17-61].
- Share as a couple, during conjugal prayer, on how you see God's dream for your family and how you can be, every day, instruments of God the Father in the realisation of this dream.

Meeting 2 - The Family in God's Design

Introduction

Human beings reach their fullness when they are connected to God and the world around them. And both are indispensable. Pope Francis warns us, in *Laudato Si*, against a crisis of excessive and obsessive individualism, when he states that "If the present ecological crisis is one small sign of the ethical, cultural and spiritual crisis of modernity, we cannot presume to heal our relationship with nature and the environment without healing all fundamental human relationships." LS, 119].

Human ecology means recreating a world where we can all reach the fullness of life. And it means creating a dignified environment for all people, that is, one that excludes no one, and at the same time, one that is dignified for humanity in all its dimensions, fully respecting its own nature.

Prayer and Meditation of the Word

During the month and based on the biblical text, the couple follow the four stages of Prayerful Reading (Lectio Divina) - reading, meditation, prayer and contemplation.

My beloved speaks and says to me:
"Arise, my love, my fair one, and come away:
for lo, the winter is past, the rain is over and gone.

The flowers appear on the earth, the time of singing has come, and the voice of the turtledove is heard in our land.

Reading of the Word of God and meditation [Cor 2, 10-12, 17; Cor 8, 6-7].

Liturgical Prayer - [Ps 44 (45), 3:8-12; 17:18].

Sharing on the Endeavours

In this meeting the focus is on **Conjugal Prayer**, which is the means above all to let the Spirit who loves us enter into our family, social and religious way of life.

Sharing Reflections on the Study Topic

Based on the challenges and attitudes proposed at the beginning of this meeting, it is suggested that the couple prepare the study topic based on the following questions:

- 1. What aspects are closest to God's plan in our family? And which ones are further away?
- 2. To what extent do we care for harmony in our marital, family and professional relationships? Do we realise the importance of kindness, respect, gentle affirmation of opinions, etc. in all areas of our lives?
- 3. Have we tried to be attentive and informed about the Church's thinking in relation to sensitive subjects that require us to take clear and bold positions?

Preparations during the next month

Science and religion, with their distinctive approaches to understanding reality, can enter into an intense dialogue fruitful for both [LS, 62].

- Read the first part of the second chapter of the Encyclical Letter Laudato Si [LS, 62-88].
- As a couple read and listen to the Word of God, truly seeking the Truth. It would be good to
 meditate on the arguments (economic, human, technical, ethical, ...) that are usually considered
 in every decision in life. Do we strive to let faith illuminate our decisions? Do we frequently give
 space to God, inviting him to be present in every decision?
- Prayerful reading (Lectio Divina) of the biblical text for the next meeting. [Rev 21,5-6]

Meeting 3 - The Dialogue between Faith and Reason

Introduction

Faith and religion have often been presented as antagonistic and restricting to science and scientific progress. Indeed, history shows us that faith and reason have sometimes been in conflict. From Ancient Greece to the Enlightenment, various philosophers and scientists have defended the need to verify the truth in order to believe in it, and for the overcoming of unfounded beliefs. The promise of a better future based only on evolution and progress gradually took hold.

However, today this is not entirely true. Mankind dominates nature, but not its passions, its special interests, its thirst for power. Another belief is coming to the fore that promises freedom through work and an alienating dependence on technology. Mankind consciously or unconsciously exploits natural resources in a selfish way, and devastates the world it inhabits, favouring the enrichment of a dominant class.

The balance between faith and science is fundamental for man to adequately relate to himself and to the world around him. "Faith and reason are like two wings on which the human spirit rises to the contemplation of truth; and God has placed in the human heart a desire to know the truth—in a word, to know himself—so that, by knowing and loving God, men and women may also come to the fullness of truth about themselves (cf.Ex.33:18; Psalm 27:8-9; 63:2-3; Jn14:8;1 Jn3:2)". Fides et Ratio, 1, John Paul II.

Prayer and meditation of the Word

For Lectio Divina

Liturgical Prayer - [Psalm 48 (49), 4-8]

Sharing on the Endeavours

In this meeting emphasis will be placed on **Listening to the Word of God**, which is the foundation for a complete understanding of the truth about God's purposes for mankind.

Sharing Reflections on the Study Topic

Based on the challenges and attitudes proposed at the beginning of this meeting, it is suggested that the couple prepare the study topic based on the following questions.

- 1. Do we feel that science and progress have conditioned our faith or are they in conflict with our understanding of worldly things? Is our faith evident in our life choices?
- 2. Are we aware that as Christians we need to keep up to date with and study Church documents in order to be able to offer others a correct perspective on events?
- 3. Do we encourage our children to study? How do we guide their choices?
- 4. Do we fearlessly express our opinions, even if they differ from those of the majority?

Final Prayer

This is the time when the team members pray for their intentions and for everything that came into their hearts during the meeting.

To begin the final prayer of this meeting, we invoke the words of Pope Francis.

Loving God,

Creator of heaven and earth and all that is in them,

You created us in your own image and made us stewards of all your creation.

You blessed us with the sun, water and

bountiful land

so that all might be nourished.

Open our minds and touch our hearts,

so that we may attend to your gift of creation.

Help us to be conscious that our common home

but to all of your creatures and to all future

generations,

and that it is our responsibility to preserve it. May we help each person secure the food and

- Discuss as a couple, during the Sit down, how you live out your responsibility in solidarity with those close to you. Who and which families around you are in a situation of suffering, unemployment, poverty, illness? Do you dare as a couple and as a family, to do more, to go out to meet and accompany these families, with discretion and generosity?
- Prayerful reading (Lectio Divina) of the biblical text for the next meeting. (Acts 2:42-47)

Meeting 4 - Joint Responsibility for the Common Good

Introduction

Integral ecology is inseparable from the notion of the common good. "The common good is respect for the human person as such, endowed with basic and inalienable rights ordered to his or her integral development." [LS, 157]. All groups and institutions, from the Family to the State, must be active champions for the defence and promotion of the common good. In the same way, and because everything is interrelated, we all have a responsibility, as citizens, to contribute to such a goal through solidarity.

In today's society, where social inequalities persist and people are deprived of their basic rights, the principle of the common good is revealed as a call for solidarity, first and foremost towards the poorest, and towards the common destiny of the goods and resources of the planet.

Lectio Divina

In this meeting the focus is on the **Sit Down,** as a way to build a new common good based on the relationship between spiritual and material gifts.

Sharing Reflections on the Study Topic

Based on the challenges and attitudes proposed at the beginning of this meeting, it is suggested that the couple prepare the study topic based on the following questions.

- 1. In a time when everything points to individual well-being, how do we live out our responsibility in solidarity with those close to us? From an environmental point of view what are the most pressing needs (*Laudato Si* Ch 4) for the improvement of the areas in which we live?
- 2. What is our attitude in the face of the challenges in our daily family life? In front of our children do we show ourselves as peace builders and defenders of our responsibility to contribute to the common good?
- 3. Do we live out the values of the Gospel in all areas of our own life? Give some examples from your own experience.
- 4. In real life, what do we do to care for the common good, at work and as global citizens?

Final Prayer

This is the time when the team members pray for their intentions and for everything that came into their hearts during the meeting.

Meeting 5 - Technology: Creativity and Power

Introduction

"In our time humanity is experiencing a turning-point in its history, as we can see from the advances being made in so many fields. We can only praise the steps being taken to improve people's welfare in areas such as health care, education and communications. At the same time, we have to remember that the majority of our contemporaries are barely living from day to day, with dire consequences. A number of diseases are spreading. The hearts of many people are gripped by fear and desperation, even in the so-called rich countries. The joy of living frequently fades, lack of respect for others and violence are on the rise, and inequality is increasingly evident. It is a struggle to live and, often, to live with precious little dignity. This epochal change has been set in motion by the enormous qualitative, quantitative, rapid and cumulative advances occurring in the sciences and in technology, and by their instant application in different areas of nature and of life. We are in an age of knowledge and information, which has led to new and often anonymous kinds of power." [EG, 52]. This power presents many risks, and it is therefore necessary to consider the effects, the context and ethical limits of technology.

Moreover, in these times when social networks and other means of human communication allow us all to be constantly connected, the challenge is to rediscover the profoundly human character of face-to-face encounters and friendship, to transmit the "mystique" of living together, to transform the possibilities for communication into opportunities for encounter and solidarity. "To go out of ourselves and to join others is healthy for us. To be self-enclosed is to taste the bitter poison of immanence, and humanity will be worse for every selfish choice we make." [EG, 87].

Prayer and meditation of the Word

It is suggested that each person and couple follow the four stages of Prayerful Reading (Lectio Divina) - reading, meditation, prayer, and contemplation during the month and based on the biblical text.

What gain have the workers from their toil? I have seen the business that God has given to everyone to be busy with. He has made everything suitable for its time; moreover, he has put a sense of past and future into their minds, yet they cannot find out what God has done from the beginning to the end. I know that there is nothing better for them than to be happy and enjoy themselves as long as they live; moreover, it is God's gift that all should eat and drink and take pleasure in all their toil knowing that whatever God does endures forever; nothing can be added to it, nor anything taken from it; God has done this, so that all should stand in awe before him. Meeting 6 - An Economy with a Soul

Introduction

In this meeting we are going to discuss and lay the foundations for a different economy, one that, "sustains and does not kill, includes and does not exclude, humanises and does not dehumanise, takes care of creation and does not pollute it", according to the invitation of Pope Francis in his letter to young entrepreneurs for the conference "The Economy of Francis" ² in 2020. The Pope goes on to say that it is necessary to "change our present economy and give a soul to the economy of the future" so that it will be more just, sustainable and inclusive.

In the same letter he also states that "we must correct the models for growth that do not guarantee respect for the environment, respect for life, care for the family, social justice, the dignity of workers, and the rights of future generations." In the face of this emergency, all of us, without exception, are called to re-examine our ways of thinking and our moral ethics. We must endeavour to create an "economy attentive to both its people and the environment" which is in keeping with the expectation of justice for all and in line with God's Plan.

Prayer and meditation of the Word

During the month and based on biblical text, we suggest that each person and each couple follow the four stages of Lectio Divina - reading, meditation, prayer, and contemplation.

Now that you have purified yourselves by your obedience to the truth so that you have genuine mutual love, love one another deeply, from the heart. You have been born anew, not of perishable but of imperishable seed, through the living and enduring word of God. [1 Peter 1, 22-23]

Reading of the Word of God and meditation [Jn 15:9-11].

In this framework, along with the importance of little everyday gestures, social love moves us to devise larger strategies to halt environmental degradation and to encourage a "culture of care" which permeates all of society. When we feel that God is calling us to intervene with others in these social dynamics, we should realise that this too is part of our spirituality, which is an exercise of charity and, as such, matures and sanctifies us. " [LS, 231].

Meeting 8 Education for a New Lifestyle

Introduction

"Many things have to change course, but it is we human beings above all who need to change. A great cultural, spiritual and educational challenge stands before us, and it will demand that we set out on the long path of renewal." [LS, 202].

Meeting 10 Review

Introduction

At the end of this year of journeying together as a team, it's time to take stock. We reflect on the road we have travelled together as a team, the dialogue and sharing we have made on the journey, always believing in God's infinite forgiveness in the face of our mistakes, but knowing that above all what saddens God is what we could have done but have left undone. It is also a commitment to the future and, in this sense, the Review must be a lever that makes each couple take a leap and go further towards holiness. Without fear, let us place ourselves before God.

"A love that is generous and outgoing, that acts and takes risks, may at times make mistakes. Here we may find timely the witness of Maria Gabriella Perin, who lost her father shortly after her birth: she reflects on how this influenced her life, in a relationship that did not last but that left her a mother and now a grandmother. 'What I know is that God makes stories. In his genius and mercy, he takes our triumphs and our failures and weaves beautiful tapestries that are full of irony. The reverse of the fabric may look messy with its tangled threads – the events of our life – and maybe this is the side we dwell on when we doubt. But the right side of the tapestry displays a magnificent story, and this is the side that God sees'. When older people look at life closely, often they instinctively know what lies behind the tangled threads, and they recognize what God can create even out of our mistakes." (Christus Vivit,198)

Prayer and meditation of the Word

During the month we suggest that each and every couple reads the biblical text following the four steps of Prayerful Reading of the Word (Lectio Divina) - Reading, Meditation, Prayer and Contemplation.

"Hear, O Israel: Keep these words that I am commanding you today in your heart. Recite them to your children and talk about them when you are at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you rise. Bind them as a sign on your hand, fix them as an emblem on your forehead, and write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates." [Deut. 6:4, 6-9].
