Letter from Regional Couple



Dear Friends in Teams.

Welcome to the October-December 2023 edition of the TeamsGB Newsletter. Although you will be reading this letter in the autumn, we are writing it on a beautiful day in August - the feast of the Queenship of the Blessed Virgin Mary, celebrated on the octave of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin. As you know, Teams is placed under the patronship of Our Lady, thus emphasising the willingness of Teams to serve her and affirm that there is no better guide to God than the Mother of

God (The Charter 1972). We seek to serve, "to make our activities a collaboration with God and a service to others" (Guide to the Teams of Our Lady"). In serving, we need to look to the future and how we go forward, nurturing and supporting existing Teams as well as creating new ones.

We had an opportunity to further reflect on the future at the TeamsGB Re-Gathering entitled "New Wine, Fresh Skins" held in April. We recognise the need to review our communications and make use of social media, to clarify our description of Teams to reflect what we actually do, to revamp some of our literature and on-line presentation, look how best to engage with parishes and clergy, find a way to measure what is working well and what is not, and much more. We have now initiated a series of workstreams that aim to address these issues. This will be the first time TeamsGB have attempted a systematic approach to growth and undoubtedly we will learn as we go!

During the Re-Gathering in April, amongst many other things, our discussion group suggested that Teams should include a focus on the environment and sustainability, which would chime with the interests of younger people. We cannot fail to mention one of the most important issues of this summer - the frequency of adverse weather events and environmental catastrophes that occurred. In spite of the lower-than-average temperatures in the UK, we have seen the devastating effects of extreme weather events, wildfires, severe hurricanes and flash floods in various parts of the world. For example, the forest fires in Greece and other parts of southern Europe, Tenerife, Canada and Hawaii,

with large numbers of people losing their lives or being displaced, floods in northern Italy, and the highest ever global temperature recorded in July.

Recently Pope Francis re-emphasised that climate change is an urgent challenge that concerns everyone, and asked world leaders to do more, and more rapidly, to limit global emissions. Pope Francis issued the encyclical entitled Laudato Si, On the Care for our Common Home in 2015. The Holy Father recently announced that he is writing a second part to Laudato Si to bring it up to date with recent events. (Vatican News, August 21st).

The Teams study topic for 2021/22 "The Christian Couple – Leaven for Renewal for the Family and Society" focused among other things on the beauty of creation and our joint responsibility for the common good. Can we keep the environment and the care of our common home at the forefront of our minds in all that we do?

The International College of Teams met in July in Aparecida in Brazil. You will hear about this from Paul and Annette on page 6. New piloting materials, developed by ERI were made available at this meeting. It comes as a pdf comprising a manual for piloting couples as well as ten pamphlets for the monthly meetings of the new couples. It can be adapted to local circumstances, and use is optional.

There are some changes to the Province Team. We would like to extend a warm welcome to the new Regional Couple for the Northern Region, David and Joanne Harries as they begin their service officially on September 1st. We were delighted to see them commissioned at the Re-Gathering, and they have been working with the Province team on our plans for the future.

We owe an immense debt of gratitude to Sue and Paul Rowney who are stepping down as Northern Regional Couple having served more than their term of office. Their dedicated service is greatly appreciated. Happily, they have agreed to continue to work with the Province team and others on the project for developing and renewing Teams.

Once more we would like to offer many thanks to the editors and contributors of this newsletter for bringing together an excellent issue, and keeping us well informed about the varied life of Teams.

Navigating the Highs and Lows of Married Life!

family life. While my aspiration was for a trio of children, Joanne's desires were openended, embracing however many blessings God would bestow upon us. International College, Brazil

Fr Caffarel on The Retreat in Teams

The Father Paulo Renato Campos, Spiritual Counsellor of the Satellite Teams offers some thoughts and insights into the Team retreat. The full text is available on the Teams website.



The "retreat" is a heritage of our Jewish-Christian tradition and that the major innovation of Henri Caffarel, without neglecting the personal retreats, is the retreat for couples.

History of retreat

In Sacred Scripture we often find important characters who sought a "space" where they could listen and better discern the voice of God in silence and recollection. Many prophets from Abraham through to John the Baptist and Jesus felt the need to take time in quiet and prayer. This continued through the history of the Christian church with the tradition of hermits and monasteries.

Couple residential retreat

Fr Caffarel was an experienced spiritual director and retreat leader. He applied this to couples and introduced a couple retreat as a Teams endeavour. It was important for both members of the couple to attend, ideally for a minimum of 48 hours, and without distractions of family responsibilities. The original retreat didn't necessarily involve the whole team although different models have evolved over time.

Important aspects of the retreat include:

- ⇒ It is different to a social or other Teams Gathering or conference.
- ⇒ It is an opportunity for prayer and silence which create "the retreat environment". Respecting the silence provides mutual help and charity towards our neighbour who wants to pray.
- ⇒ It is an opportunity for formation and development of faith as well as prayer but different from a "training session".
- ⇒ The retreat is also an opportunity to reflect on our faith as a couple and move forward in our couple spirituality.
- ⇒ Planning and preparing the topic and retreat leader is important- Teams study topics & church documents can help to guide the topics. A Teams spiritual counsellor can bring insights as a retreat leader.

Fr Paulo concludes that the couple retreat is a gift of the movement. As Pope Francis teaches us:

"... the continuous innovations of technological means, the thrill of travelling, the countless consumer offerings, sometimes leave no empty spaces where the voice of God can resound. Everything is filled with words, epidermal pleasures and rumours at an ever-increasing speed; here joy does not reign, but the dissatisfaction of those who do not know what they live for. So how can we not recognize that we need to stop this feverish race to recover a personal space, sometimes painful but always fruitful, where sincere dialogue with God takes place? At certain moments, we must face the truth of ourselves, to let it be invaded by the Lord."

October Team meeting

Matthew 23:1-12

They do not practise what they preach

Addressing the people and his disciples Jesus said, 'The scribes and the Pharisees occupy the chair of Moses. You must therefore do what they tell you and listen to what they say; but do not be guided by what they do: since they do not practise what they preach. They tie up heavy burdens and lay them on men's shoulders, but will they lift a finger to move them? Not they! Everything they do is done to attract attention, like wearing broader phylacteries and longer tassels, like wanting to take the place of honour at banquets and the front seats in the synagogues, being greeted obsequiously in the market squares and having people call them Rabbi.

'You, however, must not allow yourselves to be called Rabbi, since you have only one master, and you are all brothers and sisters. You must call no one on earth your father, since you have only one Father, and he is in heaven. Nor must you allow yourselves to be called teachers, for you have only one Teacher, the Christ. The greatest among you must be your servant. Anyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and anyone who humbles himself will be exalted.'

Psalm 130(131)

Keep my soul in peace before you, O Lord.

O Lord, my heart is not proud nor haughty my eyes.

I have not gone after things too great nor marvels beyond me.

Truly I have set my soul in silence and peace.

A weaned child on its mother's breast, even so is my soul.

O Israel, hope in the Lord, both now and forever.

Concluding prayer

Lord, may we always look for ways to serve each other, not to judge but to bring light and hope to others. May we be mindful that all goodness comes from you. Amen.

October Reflection

What so infuriated the Lord about the pharisees was their falseness. How they camouflaged themselves behind a veneer of religiosity. How they would readily hide behind their pride. The word which he often applied to them was 'hypocrite', which literally means 'someone who wears a mask'. The opposite of hypocrisy is honesty. And the antidote to hypocrisy is humility. Because humility means standing in the truth about oneself, rejoicing in the truth about others. How often in our relationships, with God and with each other, we find ourselves hiding behind masks. How liberating it is when we choose to be humble in our sit-downs, with each other and with Him. This is where we experience again and again what Jesus promised: 'the truth shall set you free' (John 8.32). That's why that other promise is also true: 'whoever humbles himself will be exalted' (Matthew 23.12).

'O my God, let me see things as they really are. Let nothing throw dust into my eyes.' This telling prayer of St Therese reveals her commitment to the truth. She had a horror of any kind of pretence. She loved simplicity, which is the opposite of duplicity. She displayed a disarming honesty in all her relationships. She was so refreshingly up front with others and with God. It's both fitting and beautiful that our psalm for this month is the one that is sung on her feast day. It celebrates the humility of a little child resting trustfully in its mother's arms. A baby doesn't hide behind the mask of pride like the pharisees. Its utter dependence is what makes it so endearing. Lying back in its mother's arms a little child reveals the intimate connection between truth and trust. May the vulnerability of a tiny baby inspire us to take off the masks we can often find ourselves hiding behind. May we be ready to risk the humility which is the firm

rock on which every lasting

relationship is founded.

November Reflection

I have to share v.4 and 5 that precedes this reading to give better context to 'do not worry'.

"Always be joyful then, in the Lord; I repeat, be joyful. Let your good sense be obvious to everybody"

One of the Teams endeavours asks that couples develop and maintain a Rule of Life; that will enable their spiritual development. I can imagine that the aspirations of this reading from Philippians contain many of those things that might be foundational and when established, deepen such a rule in a marriage. Prayer is central to the Christian purpose and ever present among Teams, as they seek the peace of God.

The expectation that we fill our minds (and lives) with truth, nobility (honour), goodness and purity, everything that we love and admire, everything we think virtuous and praiseworthy, is a commendable model for living and I suspect equally challenging for us all, who remain sinners, despite our efforts.

At many funerals, we are consoled in our loss by Psalm 23 but this psalm is written in the now, addressing how God cares for us in this life. It is a declaration of faith. When we achieve the Rule of Life we desire, we are promised that the God of peace (not just the peace of God) will be with us.

If we achieve something of these things by the way we live, after a life of

goodness and kindness, we will eventually dwell with the Lord in heaven for evermore. One of the things I often say to couples preparing for marriage is that it is the task of each to get the other into heaven. I wish you well with this divine endeavour!

Mark 1:1-8 A voice cries in the wilderness: prepare a way for the Lord

The beginning of the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Son of God. It is written in the book of the prophet Isaiah:

Look, I am going to send my messenger before you; he will prepare your way. A voice cries in the wilderness: Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight.

And so it was that John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. All Judaea and all the people of Jerusalem made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. John wore a garment of camelskin, and he lived on locusts and wild honey. In the course of his preaching he said, 'Someone is following me, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to kneel down and undo the strap of his sandals. I have baptised you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit.'

Psalm 84(85):9-14

Let us see, O Lord, your mercy, and give us your saving help.

I will hear what the Lord God has to say, a voice that speaks of peace, peace for his people. His help is near for those who fear him and his glory will dwell in our land.

Mercy and faithfulness have met; justice and peace have embraced. Faithfulness shall spring from the earth and justice look down from heaven.

The Lord will make us prosper and our earth shall yield its fruit. Justice shall march before him and peace shall follow his steps.

Concluding Prayer

Lord, help us to prepare our hearts and lives to welcome you, each day and in particular, this Advent as we look forward to celebrating your coming on earth. Amen.

December reflection

During this Advent season we are given the time and the opportunity to reflect on Jesus coming two thousand years ago, His coming to us daily in scripture, in the sacraments, in other people and His future coming. All of these come together as God's plan.

Mark introduces us to John the Baptist, who appeared 'proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins.' John made such an impression on the people that 'all Judaea and all the people of Jerusalem made their way to him.' John lived a very simple life and his message, too, was simple — 'repent'. The living out of this did not seem so simple to the people and it may not to us today either. What is it in our lives that we want or need to change? Can we recognise what we need to change? Do we even give time to thinking or praying about this? Perhaps it is something that we can discuss in our 'Sit Down'.

John not only speaks of repentance but he also tells the people that he is only the messenger: the one who is the Saviour is coming after him. John baptises with water but the one who follows will baptise with the Holy Spirit.

As Advent progresses we can ask ourselves how it is making a difference in our lives. Are we preparing ourselves for the coming of Christ or are we caught up in what is going on, or not, in our own lives and in the lives of those around us? It is so easy to be overwhelmed by what is going on us in terms of preparations for Christmas and to be so caught up that the Advent season passes us by altogether. We need to try and keep our eyes focused on Jesus and His message. We can follow John's example by what we do as well as what we say. Others will be drawn to Christ through us just as people



were drawn to Christ through John. As we go through the weeks of Advent let us be the kind of people who can lead others to Christ.
